### **Collections of Dr Louise Pirouet (1928-2012) for the history of the church, principally in East Africa, especially Uganda, 1894-c.2000-10**

M. Louise Pirouet was a teacher with the Church Missionary Society at Butere Girls' High School, Kenya, at the University College, Makerere, at Nairobi University and Homerton College, Cambridge. Her PhD.thesis, 'The Expansion of the Church of Uganda (N.A.C.) from Buganda into Northern and Western Uganda between 1891 and 1941, with special reference to the work of African Teachers and Evangelists' [CCCW Library Thesis no.28], published as *Black Evangelists: The Spread of Christianity in Uganda 1891-1914*, was a milestone in moving the focus of African church history away from the pious endeavour of white missionaries. During a very active retirement, that included campaigning for the rights of asylum seekers (having already had experience of the plight of refugees in East Africa; cf below PIR 21/4, 23/7-8), she served on the committee of the Henry Martyn Mission Studies Library (from 1998 Henry Martyn Centre, now Cambridge Centre for Christianity Worldwide) from its inception in 1994 to 2009. She was a good friend of the Centre and besides her own collections encouraged others towards the deposit of their papers with it. The present collection is largely of copy resource or secondary material that has been treated as archive in order to keep it together.

**PIR 1-3 Typescript (carbon copies) extracts of letters, etc., of Dora Skipper, CMS missionary teacher in Nabumali, Uganda. From the titles of PIR 2-3 these would appear to have been transcribed at or for University College Makerere presumably as part of the project Dr Pirouet ran for assembling records for the history of the church in Uganda. Regrettably the provenance of the originals is not given.**

Listed here as if separate items, but in fact a single series of transcripts, previously stapled together, prefaced with some general material and with an index at the end, in imitation of a published book. Dora Skipper's letters have no salutation, valediction or signature, and are headed merely with the place 'Nabumali and date. The effect is to produce a chronicle of a CMS teacher's daily life and activities Not paginated but second or third pages of each letter is sometimes headed 'sheet 2', 'sheet 3', etc. At the front (PIR 1/2-6) are some letters of others, presumably retained by Dora Skipper and included here for their contextual value. Miss Skipper's work appears to have been mainly with primary school teaching and mission to women, enrolling, etc., for Mother's Union.

Eileen Smart of Bolton le Sands, Lancs., was widow of Revd Donald (d.1967), M.A. (Cantab), vicar of Scotforth, Lancs., and a regional secretary of the Church Missionary Society. Together they had entertained many missionaries, some of whom Mrs Smart met on her trips in 1968-71. She went on the first trip by herself and the second with her daughter Catherine H.L.Smart, (c.2000-10 a Cambridge City councillor for Romsey Ward with common interests to Dr Pirouet in the welfare of immigrants and asylum seekers; presumably Dr Pirouet's source for the journals and who supplied the Centre with background information).

The diaries describe their travels in Africa, particularly in Uganda where she attended the enthronement of Janani Luwum as archbishop in January 1969. They stayed with CMS missionaries, notably Philippa Guillebaud (see Guillebaud Papers) and observed their work. Evidently written in spiral-bound *Silvine* exercise books.

Dr Margaret Mary Louise Pirouet, Senior Lecturer in Religious Studies at Homerton College 1978-1989, died peacefully on 21 December 2012. (...)

Louise came to Homerton from the University of East Africa, at Makere in Uganda where she had been teaching religious studies and undertaking radical and innovative research. She subsequently taught for many years in the Religious Studies Department at Homerton alongside Jean Holm and Grahame Miles.

In Uganda, she built on her doctoral research which had involved the extensive interviewing of African Christians about their perceptions of the faith that they had received from European missions. She was supportive thereby of the earliest African scholars' own expressions of their adopted and developing theology. Louise left Uganda in the wake of Idi Amin's ejections of foreign personnel and persecution of many of his own people. She had developed a deep attachment to Uganda and its people and retained many contacts both in that country and with exiles in the UK. There was a constant stream of visitors to her home and many also passed through Homerton. (from the [Homerton College website](#))

Pirouet was born to missionary parents in Cape Town, South Africa, but her family returned to England, where she was educated and entered the teaching profession. She returned to Africa with the Church Missionary Society, teaching at a girls' school in Kenya before completing her Ph.D. at the University of East Africa, Makere, Uganda; her thesis was published as *Black Evangelists: The Spread of Christianity in Uganda, 1891-1914* (1978). Pirouet subsequently taught at the University of Nairobi, Kenya, and from 1978 to 1989 in the Department of Religious Studies at Homerton College, University of Cambridge, where she continued her work on African history.
